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Introduction

American Preparatory Academy is excited to introduce the Winterim program for the 2018-2019 school year. The Winterim term runs from January 3rd through January 18th during normal school hours. The day will be divided into three periods and a lunch plus a core class period for each student to keep up with their regular studies.

Students will have the opportunity to choose two or three courses from the Winterim catalog depending on their grades and attendance at the end of term 1. Students with an AP class will continue their AP classes through Winterim. These courses are designed to take students deeper into subject areas than they may cover during the normal scope of a course and to explore areas that are not covered in our daily curriculum. By the end of each 12-day course, students will have completed the equivalent of a quarter's worth of curriculum and have a completed culminating project they can add to their resume or portfolio.

In addition to the skills and knowledge gained, 9th-12th grade students will have the opportunity to receive .50 credits of elective credit towards their high school graduation.

Registration and Scheduling

Winterim Courses will be filled according to a student's academic standing, attendance, and behavior. Courses will be selected through a Google Form where students will be able to

choose their 1st through 5th choices. Not all students will get their first and second requests, so please make sure the third, fourth, and fifth requests are classes the student is interested in. Students who do not choose a 3rd, 4th, and 5th choice will be assigned to a class of the administration's choice and according to class size.

Students will be unable to change Winterim requests once they have been submitted without talking to Mr. Sheneman, Mrs. Hollinger, or Mr. Christensen and submitting a change course form. Students requesting changes to their schedule must do so at the Jr. High or High School office. Students will be allowed to change Winterim requests one time only - please consider requests carefully before submitting them. The last day to change your course requests is November 9th, 2018.

Final Winterim schedules will be processed and distributed to students during December.

Courses with Fees

Some Winterim options have a cost associated with the course. These fees are kept as minimal as possible while still covering expenses like field trips, supplies, or other items necessary for the course. Without these fees, we would be unable to offer many of the exciting opportunities available during Winterim.

If you are scheduled for any Winterim courses with a fee, you must pay the fee before November 20th, 2018 to remain in that course. Any student who doesn't pay the required fee will be dropped from the course and rescheduled. Please see Mr. Sheneman for information regarding fees or fee waivers.

Winterim Scheduling Priority

Due to the limited number of spaces in some Winterim courses, there will be some courses that have a higher demand than there are seats available. All students will have a Winterim priority score that will determine in what order they are registered for courses. These scores will be calculated from the number of tardies, missing assignments, uniform infractions, and office referrals a student has had as of the end of 1st term. These are factors that are entirely within student control; we believe that this will fairly reward those who have been diligent in their school responsibilities during the first portion of the year.

Math, Latin, & Language Arts Boot Camps

Students who are not making progress in their Math, Latin, or Language Arts classes may be scheduled into a Boot Camp for one of their Winterim courses. These classes will focus on fundamental skills acquisition and prepare students for standardized testing. The curriculum of these courses will be individualized to each student based on recommendations from their Math or Language Arts teacher. Boot Camp will replace one elective class during Winterim - students in Boot Camp classes will still attend at least one elective Winterim course.

We will be making decisions about which students to place in these classes in late November to early December. To give students an opportunity to adjust to their academic habits, we will send home letters to all students who are being strongly considered for these courses. Students will still be allowed to sign up for two Winterim courses, but one of those may be changed to a Boot Camp class if they haven't increased their proficiency by December.

COURSE OFFERINGS

Arts

Introduction to Poetry Teacher: Ms. Bernkopf

This is a class for those who love how authors are able to weave their words into images that drip off the pages and curl up in your mouth, letting the words hum inside your body and and resonate within your mind. This class explores the classic and contemporary poetic forms where students will be learn how to write descriptive poetry in strict and free forms. If you have ever enjoyed poetry, written poetry, or have no clue what poetry is but are interested in learning more about the subject, come check it out! This class will include peer edits and an introduction on how to submit your work to literary magazines for publication.

Art through the Ages: Medieval through the Renaissance

Come learn more about art from Medieval times through the Renaissance! In the Medieval period we will explore weaponry, castles, books of hours, mosaics & so much more! Then we will wander through time, stopping to learn about a variety of art periods with all their unique guirks and charms. Finally we will arrive at what some historians have called the "height of art" with the Renaissance. Not only will we learn about Italian masters like Bernini, Raphael, and Michelangelo, but of Northern masters as well from Flanders & Germany such as Jan van Eyck, Bosch, and Albrecht Durer.

Part of the course will focus on the history behind the art, while the second is focused on completing artworks that correlate with the period we are studying. We will be creating some amazing pieces: including our own own coat of arms, designing medieval weapons, attempting our hand at miniature painting & charcoal drawings in the Renaissance "Window on the World" style! What could be better?!

History and fantasy collide in this exploration of Tolkien's inspirations for *The Lord of the Rings*. We'll look at the myths, lands, and people of Old England, Scandinavia, Ireland and beyond that helped breathe life into Tolkien's characters and creations and how Tolkien's vision was translated onto the screen with so much of his sources of inspiration left intact. Reading *Fellowship of the Ring* will be a requirement for this course.

Dragons, Aliens, & Superheroes Teacher: Ms. Kunz

The phrase "Here Be Dragons" was once used to indicate dangerous or unexplored territories on a map. In this class, we will seek after these fanciful, other-wordly, mysterious, perilous, and magical worlds in fiction. From Greek mythology to Marvel comics, from Tolkien to 1,001 Arabian Nights, from Brandon Sanderson's Cosmere to The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy, we will read, view and discuss a sampling of fantasy, sci-fi, and superhero fiction. We will also learn how speculative fiction has evolved over time and debate what has motivated its recent adoption by mainstream pop culture. In addition, students will work on their own speculative fiction project (e.g., a short story, a world-building project, a comic book, a short film).

We will analyze past epidemics and pandemics from the Black Death and the Spanish Flu epidemic, to the AIDS and Swine Flu epidemics of today. This class will feature simulations of disease outbreaks where the students will work cooperatively to prevent a pandemic.

So That We Know How to Live: A Course in Death and Dying

Ms. Ochs Death & Dying is intended to provide an overview of issues and circumstances that describe death, loss, and dying in our society. We will explore our own attitudes, emotions, behaviors, beliefs, and reactions related to death and the process of dying. A fact-based consideration of topics includes: cultural and historical differences in concepts of death and grief, and individual differences related to preparation, adjustment, and coping.

Amazing Ocean Animals: An Introduction to Marine BiologyTeacher: Ms. KrillFee: \$5 (Living Aquarium Entrance Fee)

Have you heard of the dumbo octopus, a species of cephalopod that resembles the beloved cartoon elephant Dumbo? Or what about the mola mola, the world's largest bony fish? In this class students will learn about the world's oceans and many of the amazing animals that inhabit them, from tiny plankton to the great blue whale. This class will include a field trip to the Living Planet Aquarium where students will get a chance to see some of the animals they have learned about in person.

Magic The Gathering Mr. Wright

Learn to make competitive decks and winning strategies in the exciting card game Magic the Gathering. In this class we will be learning about the rules strategies involved in the card game Magic The Gathering. The first week will be focused on learning the mechanics and gameplay of Standard Rules. The second week will focus on statistical analysis of how to build a deck in the Draft format of game play. The fee for this class will go to providing everyone with similar cards to make gameplay fair and fun for everyone. The last 3 days or so will be for a tournament with a prize for the 1st,2nd, and 3rd place.

Intro to Human Biology

Mr. Thorup

It's like the user manual to your own body- we will be studying the organ systems, including the skeletal, muscle, cardiovascular, endocrine, and exocrine systems. If we have time we will also dabble a little into neurology. With each system, our focus will be on what it is, what it does, and what happens when things go wrong.

This will be treated as an intro to a college style human physiology course where the content will be 20% anatomy, 80% physiology. Each day will be a lecture followed by a short study time and a lab or quiz.

Astronomy

This course will begin with a discussion of astrophysics and will include discussions of the Big Bang model of the universe, gravity, black holes, galaxies, planets, and stars. Students will then be introduced into the tools of astronomy - including telescopes and neutrino experiments. During the last part of the course, we will spend time observing the night skies with telescopes.

Breaking News: How to look past spin.

Learn to find the calm in the eye of the storm and find solid evidence to understand what is going on in the world around you. This class will look at current events in the news. The goal of this class will be to develop the skill of reading a biased news source and finding unbiased facts in the story. In today's world there is such a large amount of information available it is hard to find facts and truth. We will read news paper articles and internet articles covering events from different angles. The hope is that by looking at both sides of an argument we can find unbiased facts that both sides agree on.

Extreme Science Mr. Wright

Take your mind to the limits of human thought. The point of this course will be to look at the cutting edge of science and technology. We will read articles and papers about new exciting technologies and discuss the importance and implications these technologies have in relation to our society. The focus will be on physics and engineering. The course will be more exploratory in nature than analytical.
